Kane County Fair – Open Class

Information: (630) 584-6926

1. All exhibitors must have their animals in place by Tuesday, July 18, 9:00 p.m. C.D.S.T., except hogs, home economics, and light horses (see department). Livestock (open class only) will be released from 11 p.m. Saturday until 11 a.m. Sunday. All other Livestock will not be released until after 6:00 p.m. Sunday. All exhibits other than livestock may not be removed until after 7:00 p.m. on Sunday, July 23, except the first show of floriculture and horticulture which will be released Friday, July 21, after 7:00 p.m. All trade exhibits will be in place until 9:00 on Sunday evening. Any exhibitors failing to comply with the above rule will forfeit his premiums won during the Fair. All livestock must be off the grounds by Monday evening following the closing of the Fair.
2. No entry of livestock will be allowed to unload until the health certificates have been properly checked by the Superintendent and pens assigned. See page 4 (Exhibition Livestock Health Requirements for 2000). Registration papers for pure breed swine must accompany them to the scale.
3. All entries must be in the hands of the Secretary of the Fair July 2, 2000.
4. Exhibitors will be limited to two monies in any one class except special ruling by department.
5. Each exhibitor in the open classes will be furnished one additional helper's ticket for each 7 cattle; 8 sheep.
6. Each exhibitor is responsible for his own feeding equipment and straw and must keep his pens and exhibits in good order. Premiums will be withheld from any exhibitor failing to keep his pens in a presentable manner.
7. The fair reserves the right to refuse permission for the entry to show, if the entry is not considered worthy of merit.
8. Special additional premiums by Breed Associations are offered, but are subject to final approval of the respective associations.
9. Classes without competition may be combined at the discretion of the superin-

tendents.

10. All entries must be accompanied by check or money order for entry and stall fees. Exhibitors desiring to enter animals in the Open Class which are also entered in 4-H competition must pay an entry fee for each Open Class entry.
11. All exhibitors must be prepared to parade their livestock subject to the call of the Superintendent of each division. Any refusal shall automatically forfeit their premiums won by this entry. All Premiums of exhibitors will be forfeited if livestock leaves before permission is granted by the Department Superintendent.
12. The interpretation of all rules concerning the Fair shall rest entirely with the Fair and its decision shall be final.
13. Watchman shall be provided by the Kane County Fair to guard exhibits, but it cannot be held responsible for the personal loss or injury from fire, theft, or any other cause during the duration of the Fair.
14. The Fair gates will be open to the public at 7:00 a.m. daily. Except Tuesday, 2:00 p.m.
15. The applications for renting concession space or exhibit space either outdoors or in the general exhibition area should be made to the Kane County Fair, P.O. Box 467, St. Charles, Illinois 60174. Phone Area Code 630-584-6926.
16. Service trucks will be allowed in the grounds until 11:00 a.m. and between 4:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m.
17. Assignments of stalls and pens will be made by the department superintendents and all exhibitors are expected to comply with such assignments. Stall and pen fees are paid on all open class exhibits.
18. Fair grounds are located on Randall Road between Route 64 and Route 38 in St. Charles.
19. Free admission tickets are given to all 4-H boys and 4-H girls of Kane County who exhibit at the Fair, Department Superintendents and assistants, Press and Radio. Concessionaires receive one general admission ticket. Concessionaires will be charged \$100.00 per cut-in on electricity and a \$12 per day house trailer parked on grounds. Trade exhibitors receive four season passes.
20. Parents of livestock exhibitors will be allowed to unload livestock exhibits up to 9:00 p.m. Tuesday, July 18th, without an admission ticket.
21. All trade people and contractors' employees—such as ice men, ice cream trucks, bread trucks, etc., must secure a season pass.
22. Judges will receive a free season pass.
23. \$2 daily parking is available in the Fair's parking lots west and north of grounds.
24. Premium checks not picked up (at fair office) by Sunday night will be forfeited.
25. All exhibitors shall confine their activities to their booths and not to exceed three feet in front of their booths.
26. No refunds for any livestock deemed not to qualify or associated pen/stall fees.
27. All cattle must be washed on wash rack.
28. No animals are to be released from the fairgrounds until all sale animals have

been accounted for and superintendent's permission given.

2000 EXHIBITION LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

County Fairs

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

Health Certificate or Certificate of Veterinary Inspection

The term "health certificate" or "certificate of veterinary inspection" means a legible record, made on an official form of the state of origin, issued by an accredited veterinarian, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of destination.

A health certificate must:

1. Accompany animals (EXCEPT Illinois goats, Illinois equidae, Illinois steers, Illinois calves less than 6 months of age, Illinois sheep, and animals in terminal classes if isolated from other livestock), and be available on request by Animal Health Officials;
2. Show results of required tests and/or vaccinations;
3. Show name and address of owner or exhibitor.
4. Be dated and signed by an accredited veterinarian; and
5. Show only one identification per line on the health certificate.

Note: No corrections or additions will be allowed on a health certificate.

Animals with active lesions of ringworm with resulting loss of hair, or multiple warts easily visible without close examination, will not be permitted to exhibit.

Animals infested with scabies or mange will not be permitted to exhibit.

Department personnel may collect blood, tissue or urine samples from any animal being exhibited and/or raced at any Illinois fair to test for the presence of illegal drugs.

All exhibitors of animals at any Illinois fair or exhibition shall comply with the provisions of the Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act. If violations are observed, the animal(s) will be excused from exhibition and be ordered removed from the grounds with all awards being forfeited.

Any practice or deviation from normal accepted care, including physical, medical or mechanical application, other than on the prescription of a licensed veterinarian, will constitute a violation of show rules and are subject to the above provisions.

CATTLE

OUT-OF-STATE CATTLE – Accompanied by health certificate issued within 30 days prior to exhibition, showing individual identification of each animal by a fully healed and legible tattoo, official metal tag, or registration number, or individual brands, if brand is recorded on the registration certificate.

Tuberculosis:

All cattle, including steers, must originate from accredited tuberculosis-free herd,

OR a tuberculosis accredited-free state, OR individual animals negative to tuberculin test within 60 days prior to exhibition.

Brucellosis:

1. Applies to females 6 months of age and over and bulls 18 months of age and over:
 - a. Negative brucellosis test conducted at a state or federal laboratory within 30 days Prior to exhibition, OR
 - b. Animals originated from a “Class Free” state (if entire state is so classified); OR
 - c. Animal originated from a certified brucellosis-free herd, were included in last test, and certified herd number and date of last test are shown on health certificate, OR
 - d. Officially vaccinated heifers of the dairy breeds under 20 months of age and officially vaccinated heifers of the beef breeds under 24 months of age are not required to be tested if health certificate shows record of vaccination.
2. Steers are not required to be tested for brucellosis.
3. Female cattle in terminal market classes are not required to be tested for brucellosis; provided, they are not commingled with breeding animals being exhibited.

ILLINOIS CATTLE — All cattle, except steers and calves less than 6 months of age are to be accompanied by a health certificate* issued within 90 days prior to exhibition, showing individual identification of each animal by a fully healed and legible tattoo, official metal tag, or registration number, or individual brands, if brand is recorded on the registration certificate.

Tuberculosis: Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Illinois cattle.

Brucellosis: Illinois is an Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois cattle.

SWINE

OUT-OF-STATE SWINE — Accompanied by an entry permit number and a health certificate issued within 30 days prior to exhibition. Swine shall be individually identified by ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch. Ear notch identification is acceptable for barrows, crossbred gilts and breeding swine. Health certificate shall show:

Pseudorabies:

1. Breeding swine of all ages to be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition; OR that the swine originated from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd and the qualified pseudorabies negative herd number and date of last qualification test are listed on the health certificate.
2. Barrows or females in terminal market classes* must meet the same test requirements as breeding swine if these classes are held “exhibits not intended for slaughter.” When terminal classes are held on a day when no other livestock are present, these animals are exempt from all test requirements of

breeding swine and do not need a health certificate. The pens occupied by such animals may be used only for slaughter animals during the 30 days following cleaning and disinfecting.

Brucellosis:

1. Breeding swine, 4 months of age and over, to be negative to an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition; OR that brucellosis-free herd and validated herd number and date of last validation test are listed on health certificate, OR originate from a validated brucellosis-free state. Swine brucellosis tests for exhibition shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory
2. Barrows or females in terminal market classes* must meet the same test requirements as breeding swine if these classes are held in conjunction with other livestock exhibits not intended for slaughter. When terminal classes are held on a day when no other livestock are present, these animals are exempt from all test requirements of breeding swine and do not need a health certificate. The pens occupied by such animals may be used only for slaughter animals during the 30 days following cleaning and disinfecting.

ILLINOIS SWINE – Accompanied by health certificate issued within 90 days prior to exhibition. Swine shall be individually identified by ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch. Ear notch identification is acceptable for barrows, crossbred gilts and breeding swine. Health certificate shall show:

Pseudorabies:

1. Breeding swine of all ages to be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within 90 days prior to exhibition; OR that the swine originated from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd and the qualified pseudorabies negative herd number and date of last qualification test are shown on health certificate.
2. Barrows or females in terminal market classes* must meet the same test requirements as breeding swine if these classes are held in conjunction with other livestock exhibits not intended for slaughter. When terminal classes are held on a day when no other livestock are present, these animals are exempt from all test requirements of breeding swine and do not need a health certificate. The pens occupied by such animals may be used only for slaughter animals during the 30 days following cleaning and disinfecting.

Brucellosis:

1. Brucellosis test is not required for Illinois swine.
Any member of the porcine (swine) family must comply with the above mentioned provisions, as to a health certificate, an entry permit number for out-of-state swine, individual identification, and the necessary tests.

*All swine in terminal classes must be identified by an official swine tattoo (Tattoo: conforming to the six-character alphanumeric National Tattoo System, that provides a **unique identification for each herd.**) Tattoos of at least 4-characters must be used before being shipped to slaughter. Each county fair are required to maintain records for at least 2 years on the following information: 1) the official swine tattoo applied to the swine; 2) Any other

approved identification appearing on the swine; 3) The owners name and complete mailing address; and 4) The name and complete mailing address where the identification was applied.

Swine from pseudorabies quarantined herds **ARE NOT ALLOWED** to exhibit regardless of whether or not the show is terminal or non terminal.

GOATS

OUT-OF-STATE GOATS — Accompanied by health certificate issued within 60 days prior to exhibition showing identification by ear tattoo, metal or plastic ear tag or other positive identification. The issuing veterinarian shall certify that he/she observed the flock of origin and found the goats free from visible evidence of any infectious, contagious or communicable disease. Goats from a flock with a laboratory diagnosis of scrapie are not permitted to exhibit.

ILLINOIS GOATS — Health certificates will not be required for Illinois goats. It is expected that the health certificates will be replaced by additional physical observation of the goats at the fairgrounds by fair personnel at time of entry. Goats, including dairy goats, with any or all of the following conditions shall not be exhibited and must be removed immediately from the exhibition area:

- 1) Lesions of contagious ecthyma (sore mouth),
- 2) Active lesions of ringworm with resulting loss of hair,
- 3) Caseous lymphadenitis as evidenced by draining abscesses.

SHEEP

OUT-OF-STATE SHEEP – Accompanied by health certificate issued within 60 days prior to exhibition, showing identification by ear tattoo, metal or plastic ear tag or other positive identification. The issuing veterinarian shall certify that he/she observed the flock of origin and found the sheep free from visible evidence of any infectious, contagious or communicable disease. Sheep from a flock with a laboratory diagnosis of scrapie are not permitted to exhibit.

ILLINOIS SHEEP – Health certificates will not be required for Illinois origin sheep. It is expected that the health certificates will be replaced by additional physical observation of the sheep at the fairgrounds by fair personnel for visible evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable disease. Sheep from a flock with a laboratory diagnosis of scrapie are not permitted to exhibit.

All wethers must be slick shorn before weigh-in so that show lamb fungus can be identified.

Any animal which shows lesions of contagious ecthyma (sore mouth) or active lesions of ringworm with resulting loss of hair may not be exhibited and must be removed from the exhibition area.

The Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act prohibits physical mistreatment of animals. The use of electrical shock, OR manual striking of sheep, OR withholding feed and water are considered violations of this Act. The presence of any type of equipment to induce electrical shock in the exhibition area will be considered as intent to inflict electrical shock on animals under care of the person with the equipment. Persons found mistreating sheep shall be prohibited from exhibiting

and be dismissed from the fairgrounds.

HORSES, PONIES, MULES AND OTHER EQUINE

ILLINOIS EQUINE (horses, ponies, mules, etc.) – (Exhibition and Race)

Equine 12 MONTHS AND OLDER participating in an advertised equine event (“Advertised equine event” means a show, rodeo, sale, auction, exhibition, trail ride, or horse fair, that is posted or media promoted) shall be accompanied by a **NEGATIVE TEST FOR Equine Infectious Anemia (E.I.A.) Coggins or CELISA conducted WITHIN ONE (1) YEAR.** A health certificate (Certificate of Veterinary Inspection) is not required for Illinois Equine.

OUT-OF-STATE EQUINE (horses, ponies, mules, etc.) – (Exhibition and Race) Equine entering Illinois will be required to be accompanied by a **HEALTH CERTIFICATE (Certificate of Veterinary Inspection) ISSUED WITHIN 30 DAYS OF ENTRY and equine 12 MONTHS AND OLDER MUST HAVE A NEGATIVE TEST FOR Equine Infections Anemia (E.I.A.) (Coggins or CELISA) WITHIN THE LAST 12 MONTHS.**

LLAMAS

There are no requirements governing movement of llamas within or into Illinois.

POULTRY

1. All entries (except waterfowl, i.e., domesticated fowl that normally swim, such as ducks and geese) in a show or exhibition shall have originated from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent hatchery or flock; OR have a negative pullorum-typhoid test within 90 days prior to exhibition. Exhibitor shall show proper information as to name and address of the owner or exhibitor, name and address of the authorized testing agent, date of the testing; also, the number, breed and species of those tested.
2. Prior to being used to transport poultry to a show, all crates, boxes, containers and vehicles should be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected.
3. Any poultry vaccinations must be performed at least 4 weeks prior to delivery to show.
4. Upon admission to a show, all entries shall be examined by the official county fair veterinarian or qualified state personnel who shall also receive and examine all certificates necessary for admission of birds to a show. Birds not in show condition will be excused from exhibition and removed from the premises. Any fowl showing signs of illness during the fair will be removed from the exhibition grounds.
5. A list of entries of poultry or other fowl must be compiled for the show by the show secretary. Entries must be made on Form P-2 and shall include name, address, telephone number and total number of poultry entered (not rabbits or pigeons). It is recommended that Form P-2 be signed by the show superintendent prior to the judging of poultry. Forms and instructions for compiling the entry list will be mailed to the secretary of each poultry show by the Division of Animal Industries.

Note: These poultry exhibition health requirements do not apply to 4-H and FFA 1-day poultry shows where entries are taken to the show and returned home the

same day, unless the entries are in Division I fairs with state premiums being paid as recorded in the Annual Recapitulation of the Reports of the Agricultural and Industrial Fairs Receiving Aid from the state of Illinois. When the exhibition requirements do not apply, the entries are not inspected by an official county fair veterinarian or qualified state personnel.

Exhibition health requirements do not apply to pigeons or rabbits in any show.

RATITES

(Ostriches, Emus, Rheas, Cassowaries and Kiwis)

ILLINOIS RATITES – There are no requirements governing movement of Illinois ratites within Illinois.

OUT OF STATE RATITES – Accompanied by an entry permit number and health certificate issued within 30 days. Ratites shall be individually identified by leg band or microchip. All ratites must have a negative test for Avian Influenza within 10 days prior to entry.

CERVIDAE

(Deer, Elk, Reindeer, Caribou, Moose, Red Deer, and Other Related Species)

ILLINOIS CERVIDAE – There are no requirements governing movement of cervidae within Illinois.

OUT-OF-STATE CERVIDAE — All cervidae (deer and elk) entering Illinois shall be accompanied by a health certificate issued within 30 days of importation and meet the following:

1. A permit number (217/782-4944) for all cervidae with the number of animals, name and address of consignor and the name and complete mailing address of consignee.
2. All cervidae must be individually identified by ear tag, microchip, or tattoo. The unique identification must be listed on the health certificate.
3. The issuing veterinarian shall certify that he/she observed the herd of origin and found the cervidae to be free of visible evidence of any contagious, infectious or communicable disease.

TUBERCULOSIS REQUIREMENTS:

All cervidae 12 months of age or over, shall be negative to two (2) single cervical tests for bovine TB no less than 90 days apart with the second test conducted within 90 days prior to entry and were isolated from all other members of the herd during the testing period unless they originated from an accredited, qualified or monitored herd:

1. Cervidae from an accredited herd may be moved into Illinois without further TB testing provided they are accompanied by a certificate stating that such cervids originated from an accredited herd.
2. Cervids originating from qualified or monitored herd may enter with a negative test within 90 days prior to entry and a certificate stating that the animals originate from a monitored herd.

BRUCELLOSIS REQUIREMENTS:

Elks 6 months of age or older need a negative brucellosis card or PCFIA test within 60 days prior to entry.

**To Livestock Producers receiving and veterinarians filling out
Form M-120**

Instructions for completing Form M-120 for County and State Fairs. The numbers listed below correspond to the numbers on the sample form. All blocks **Must Be Completed!**

1. Name (owner and farm name) and complete mailing address.
2. Name of show. (i.e. Illinois State Fair, various county fairs, etc.)
3. Number of animals in shipment **MUST BE LISTED** and **CORRESPOND TO THE NUMBER OF ANIMALS LISTED BELOW.**
4. Mark (X) a species (more than one species may be listed).
5. Mark (X) the purpose of movement.
6. Herd or Flock Status. List the herd number for the appropriate species when applicable.
- 6a. Last test date. List the last test date for the herd number listed.
7. Record any vaccines and/or treatment to an animal and the withdrawal time.
8. **LIST ALL FORMS OF IDENTIFICATION!** When an animal has more than one form of identification (i.e. metal eartag and an ear tattoo) list them all.
9. Registry name. List registration numbers and names.
10. Record the age of the animal.
11. Record the sex of the animal.
12. Record the breed of the animal.
13. Test information. When testing is required for a species, the test date, laboratory name and test results **MUST BE LISTED** on the health certificate.
14. Record the calfhood vaccination symbol when applicable.
15. Date issued **MUST BE COMPLETED** or the health certificate **WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.**
16. Date inspected must be completed.
17. Signature of Accredited Veterinarian **MUST BE COMPLETED** or the health certificate **WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.**

NOTE: Any corrections (test information, date issued, identification, etc.) **OR** any animals added to a health certificate must be done by and signed by the issuing veterinarian. Any corrections or animals added without the issuing veterinarians signature will not be accepted. Veterinarians initials will not be accepted.

Fat Stock Class will be weighed Wednesday, July 19 starting at 8:00 a.m. Fat Stock Classes will be Angus, Hereford, Shorthorn, and All Others. Weight Classes and breed characteristics will be determined by the Superintendent.

SPECIAL HEREFORD STEER SHOW

Any Hereford Steer that was purchased from a member of the Top Ten Hereford Association is eligible for this Class. Official Rules of Milking Competition Wednesday and Thursday, July 19 and 20, 2000

This show is sanctioned by the ADGA and their rules shall govern. Does must be registered or recorded in the American Dairy Goat Association, the American Goat Society, or the Canadian Goat Society, and proof of such registration or recordation must be shown. Doe must be identified by tattoo and the tattoo information must be part of her official record in the ADGA office at the time of test. Only one prize money per exhibitor per class. Owners who want to save milk shall furnish a container to be kept away from milking area.

The owner shall certify to the Superintendent in charge and to ADGA the fact that the goat has not within 10 days of date of test received milk, thyroprotein or any toxic condition powder which states on the label that it will increase any milk production. This certificate shall be made out and signed by the owner in the presence of the Superintendent at the time the animal is brought into the barn.

Goats entered in milking competition shall be on the show ground the evening before and shall be milked dry and stripped dry under supervision of the official tester 24 hours before the hour set for the final milking in the competition. All animals entered must be in place by 9 p.m., Tuesday, July 18th. Milkout will be 7:00 a.m., Wednesday, July 19th and Thursday, July 20th, 2000. Written proof must be furnished in case of emergency.

Animals arriving late will be milked out upon arrival at the show under the same supervision of the official milkout. There shall be two milkings for the competition. Anticipated time of milking is 7:00 p.m., and period of time since last kidding and for butterfat as follows:

- a. For each pound of milk, one pint figured to 1 decimal.
- b. For each complete ten days the goat has been in milk since last kidding one tenth .1 of a point, with maximum of 3.6 points.
- c. For each .05 pounds of butterfat yielded in the milkings, one point.
- d. Any goat that received 18 points will be awarded a Star Milker certificate.

Feed will be furnished. Feeding and watering will be done by Superintendent. Exhibitors are requested to bring containers for food and water for all waterfowl.

All birds are examined by department personnel who shall also receive and examine all certificates necessary. In case of sickness, the birds will be rejected.

Standard of perfection will be the guide in awarding premiums, except in the case of Cross Hybrids. Awards will be made by comparison by a competent licensed A.P.A. or A.B.A. judge. All birds disqualified will not be awarded a prize. All exhibitors are requested to be present or have a representative present at the time of judging.

Production pen shall consist of three young males in the meat production class and three young females in the egg production class. Birds in individual entries may not be shown in pen entries and pen entries cannot be shown in individual entries. The terms cock, cockerel, hen, and pullet are defined as follows: Cock, male bird hatched prior to January 1, 2000; cockerel, a male bird hatched since January 1, 2000; hen, a female bird hatched prior to January 1, 2000; pullet, a female bird hatched since January 1, 2000. In the case of waterfowl, old refers to birds hatched prior to January 1, 2000, and young refers to birds hatched since January 1, 2000. Waterfowl classes may be consolidated by the Superintendent where the number of entries does not warrant separate classes.

No cards or distinguishing marks will be allowed on the coops or birds until after awards are made.

The association will not be responsible for accidents or loss by fire, heat, theft, or malicious intent.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All exhibitors must be regularly enrolled in 4-H by May 1st. Only projects listed on

the enrollment records may be shown. All exhibits must be completed by the 4-H'er during the current year beginning Sept. 1, 1999. (Refer to specific departments for livestock ownership dates).

2. Entries are required for all classes. All entries must be listed on the County Fair 4-H REGISTRATION FORM (available from the club contact leader) and must be submitted to the 4-H office by June 23.

3. Exhibits will be judged against a set of standards for each project. JUDGES DECISIONS ARE FINAL. Ribbons will be awarded according to the following levels of achievement:

Blue Award - Project meets the standards

Red Award - Project needs improvement

White Award - Project needs much improvement

4. Class Champion Ribbons will be selected from exhibits in the BLUE AWARD group, if merited. Other Special Awards(unless noted otherwise) will be selected from Class Champion winners, only, if merited.

5. Exhibitors are limited to one entry per class, except livestock market classes which are allowed two (2).

6. Due to State Allocations there is NO guarantee as to the amount of premium money paid per exhibit.

7. Conference judging is mandatory for ALL exhibits. In the event a

project cannot be conferenced judged (only exceptions: 1. out of town; 2. illness; 3. family emergency) the 4-H'er must contact the 4-H office in writing and a summary of material learned will be required. (Summary may be written, audio, or video, should show at least 3 new things learned.)

8. If 4-H exhibits are checked in late or do not comply with the exhibit requirements, the standards have not been met, and the exhibit will be lowered one rating by the judges. (with exception to livestock exhibits)

9. Release time for exhibits: 4-H exhibits will be released on Sunday 7:00 to 8:00 p.m. (The Extension Service is not responsible for projects not picked up on Sunday.)

10. State Fair Eligibility: 4-H members must be 10 years old by September 1, 1999 to show an exhibit at the State Fair. Only one non-livestock project may be shown with the exception of dogs and the bicycle rodeo.

11. 4-H members wishing to exhibit in the OPEN class must comply with the Kane County Fair Board governing those classes.

12. Interpretation of the rules and regulations is the responsibility of the 4-H Fair Committee. Exhibitors and those seeking privileges must agree to abide by these interpretations.

13. All complaints should be put in writing and filed with the 4-H office on or before Monday, following the fair.

14. Failure to comply with any of the rules may be sufficient cause to forfeit all premiums by the exhibitor.

Any changes or corrections to 4-H Fair regulations and all additional fair information will be printed in the 4-H Fair Newsletter.

15. Please check specific division rules.

16. Picture trophy winners for non-animal projects must come to the 4-H (Industrial) building and sign up to have pictures taken prior to Friday, 6:00 p.m. All pictures must be taken by 10:00 a.m., Saturday. Animal superintendents will arrange for picture times and distribution

17. Only animals entered as 4-H exhibits can be brought into the 4-H exhibit areas.

18. No 4-H animals or poultry can be sold at the fair with the exception of the Blue Ribbon Sale

19. 4-H advertisement will be allowed in designated areas only. All sales (excluding the Blue Ribbon Sale) must be finalized off the fairgrounds.

20. Only 4-H members who exhibit will receive a free season fair pass.

21. Volunteers are not to consume alcohol or illegal substances while responsible for youth in 4-H activities nor allow 4-H youth participants under supervision to do so.

22. Those selected as State Fair Delegates must sign the State Fair Delegate Board by Friday, July 21, 5:00 p.m. All alternates interested in attending State Fair should also sign the board by this date. Alternate notification will be in order of selection.

4-H Livestock Exhibit

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All entries must be exhibited in the Show Ring by owner, unless special permission is given by Superintendent of the department. Exceptions when granted, are to be limited to the replacement also being a current 4-H member of Kane County.
2. No person except exhibitor will be permitted in the Ring while animals are being shown.
3. Pens and stalls will be designated by Superintendent in each division.
4. Livestock will not be permitted to tie out until 8:00 p.m. each night.
5. All animals in breeding classes must be registered in exhibitor's name and correspond to 4-H rules on ownership. Registration papers for purebred animals must be presented at time of showing. No partnership will be honored in livestock exhibits. Horses must be owned or leased.
6. A clean barn award will be given for the most attractive club exhibit within the poultry, goat, sheep, beef, rabbit, swine, dairy, and horse departments. Competition between divisions will also be judged, and an award will be given for the cleanest barn.
7. Animals to be eligible to show must be accompanied by approved health papers. Health papers are to be turned in to respective superintendents prior

to unloading. For specific health requirements, see Exhibition Livestock Health Requirements near front of this book.

8. Superintendents have the right to dismiss any animal not suitable for showing.

9. All cattle are to be washed on wash rack.

10. No animals are to be released from the Fairgrounds until all sale animals have been loaded.

11. Permission to remain overnight in the barns must be obtained prior to the opening of the Fair. (Parent permission forms can be obtained in the Extension Office).

12. 4-H members exhibiting animals in open class must pay a stall fee.

13. Only those volunteers/superintendents who do not have children exhibiting or who are not selling show animals (per species/barn) will be allowed to read the scales.

14. Only animals entered as 4-H exhibits can be brought into the 4-H exhibit areas.

15. No 4-H animals or poultry can be sold at the fair with the exception of the Blue Ribbon Sale.

16. 4-H advertisement will be allowed in designated areas only. All sales (excluding the Blue Ribbon Sale) must be finalized off the fairgrounds.

SPECIAL NOTICE

For County/State Fair Exhibitors

Quality Assurance and Animal Ethics Clinic

1. In order to exhibit sheep, swine, beef, horses, dairy, poultry, rabbits, and goats at the county fair, a 4-H member **MUST ATTEND AN ETHICS TYPE CLINIC ONLY ONE TIME**. (Those who have attended in the past are grandfathered in and need not attend again.)

2. Any first time exhibitor at the county/state fair, in beef, swine, sheep, dairy, or horses **MUST ATTEND AN APPROVED ETHICS CLINIC THIS YEAR**. (Once an exhibitor has attended a clinic and shown at the county/state fair, they do not need to attend another clinic.)

3. Junior Exhibitors will be required to sign an affidavit that they “personally cared for the animal, they did not tamper with it, and it does not contain residues.” Contact the extension office if questions...

SPECIAL NOTICE

All exhibitors of animals shall comply with the provisions of the Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act. If violations are observed, the animals will be excused from exhibition and be ordered to be removed from the grounds with all awards being forfeited. As determined by Fair officials, superintendent, and veterinarians any practice or deviation from normal humane husbandry practices, including, but not limited to artificial manipulations, physical abuse, medical treatments or mechanical applications of any substance, other than on the prescription of a licensed veterinarian, will constitute a violation of show rules and are subject to the above provisions.

1. In order to exhibit sheep, swine, beef, horses, dairy, poultry, rabbits, and goats at the county fair, a 4-H member MUST ATTEND AN ETHICS TYPE CLINIC ONLY ONE TIME. (Those who have attended in the past are grandfathered in and need not attend again.)

2. Any first time exhibitor at the county/state fair, in beef, swine, sheep, dairy, horses, goats, poultry and rabbits MUST ATTEND AN APPROVED ETHICS CLINIC THIS YEAR. (Once an exhibitor has attended a clinic and shown at the county/state fair, they do not need to attend another clinic.)

3. Junior Exhibitors will be required to sign an affidavit that they “personally cared for the animal, they did not tamper with it, and it does not contain residues.” Contact the extension office if questions...

REGULATIONS:

1. Verification of up to date rabies vaccine MUST accompany dog to show and be presented to Supt. at check-in. (Rabies tag is NOT Proof)

(This class is not eligible for high trophy.) Dog will also be judged on appearance. Dog should be appropriately groomed.

Class: Graduate Beginner: Heel; and Figure 8; *stand for examination; *recall; *long sit (1 min.); *long down (3 min.). Handlers across the ring for long sit and down. (This class not eligible for high trophy.)

Class: Novice I (Dogs either in 2nd yr. of training, having had other professional help, or otherwise advanced dogs. Computer Science

Superintendent – Bob Gibson

Exhibitors will be asked to give a presentation/explanation of their exhibit to judge. A presentation using a computer is not required. No computers will be furnished. Exhibitors may bring computer equipment if they wish. The Fair Board and Extension Office are not responsible for the safety or security of any computer equipment. Telephone modem connections are not available for use by exhibitors. Any member found to be using computer software in a manner that infringes on copyright laws will be disqualified. Use computer project guide Lost In Cyberspace.

Class: Introduction to Computers - Exhibit a poster or demonstration that shows knowledge related to Units 1 and 2 in the computer project guide, such as:

- the main parts of typical home or office desktop computer.
- the operating system
- the use and workings of common application programs such as word

processors or graphics drawing programs

Class: Using Computer Programs - Exhibit a product that member produced using

selected software application, along with a written description of how the product was produced. Recommended software applications include word processing programs, spreadsheet programs, database manager programs, graphics and design programs, accounting programs, communications programs, presentation programs, and/or Web page design programs (or any other software application covered in Unit 3 of the project guide).

Class: Beginning Computer Programming - Exhibit a flowchart or alternative visual representation of a program that exhibitor has written, not copied from another source. Exhibitor also may choose to demonstrate the actual program. (NOTE: Neither computers nor telephone modem connections are provided to exhibitors.) Choice of programming language is optional. Programs exhibited in this class require the use of one or more of each of the following kinds of commands:

- (1) Comments to the reader of the program (e.g., "Now subtract Taxes from GrossPay to get NetPay").
- (2) Instructions to the user of the program (e.g., "Press Q at any time to quit this program").
- (3) Assignment of data into variables (e.g., "NetPay=GrossPay Taxes;").
- (4) Choosing between alternatives based on the current value of a variable (e.g., "IF NetPay>=100000 THEN PRINT 'THANK YOU, BOSS!' ELSE GOTO 999")
- (5) Looping, that is, repeating a group of instructions more than once, using a looping structure ("FOR", "DO", etc.). The ending of the loop must be controlled, not just left to loop forever (e.g., "10 GOTO 10"). Controlling the end of the looping may be done using an "IF" statement from item 4.
- (6) Input from, and output to a user.

Class: Intermediate Computer Programming - Exhibits in this class allow exhibitor to work in more depth in those application areas of computer programming that interest them. Exhibits in this class must meet all the requirement of class G3015, plus as many of the following as apply:

- (1) Checking for and dealing with errors in some reasonable way (e.g., suppose GrossPay contains a negative number, or Taxes contains a value larger than GrossPay-what then?).
- (2) Input from and/or output to a file or database (or some device or program than to the user).
- (3) Use of defined functions, procedures, or macros to reduce complexity and duplication within the program.
- (4) Ways to get the user help, or clues, if they get stuck, or they don't understand what to do next.

Class: Special Topics in Computers - Projects in this class permit exhibitors to explore in detail any aspect of computers that interests them and is not within the

scope of all above classes. Exhibit may include such things as a computer built from component cards, a report on the effect of computers on the economy, and/or description of a computer-based service or business they operate.

SPECIAL NOTES:

Web Pages:

Web pages present an ongoing dilemma for selecting exhibit classes, because they represent a very broad range of skill and understanding by the member. This breadth prevents an easy solution of simply creating a single exhibit class for web pages. Short of inventing an entire new series of 2-3 classes dealing strictly with pages, the best alternative is to classify exhibits individually, based on the level of knowledge and skill represented in the exhibit along the following guidelines:

- All web pages developed with a software program either designed specifically for that purpose or with a function for automatic HTML coding (e.g. the "save as HTML" command in Microsoft Word) should be entered in the second class: Using Computer Programs
- Simple web pages designed with HTML coding written by the member or augmented with features downloaded from other web sites, should also be entered in Class 2: Using Computer Programs
- Web pages containing a significant amount of Java programming done by member should be entered in Class 3: Beginning Computer Programming - as long as the programming meets the third classes' requirements. This does not include Java created components the member simply downloads from another site. It is the responsibility of the judge to ascertain how much actual programming has been done by the exhibitor.
- It is possible to write advanced programs in JavaScript that meet the requirements of Class 4: Intermediate Computer Programming. Again, it is the judge's responsibility to ascertain how much actual programming has been done (vs. downloading).
- If the web page doesn't seem to fit into one specific category

from

above, enter the exhibit in Class 5: Special Topics in Computers.

Computer Science Judges reserve the right to switch exhibits to different classes as needed to meet the classification designations.

ELECTRICITY

It is strongly suggested that members use recommended construction details provided by the Illinois Electrification Committee (IEC) that has been provided to local Extension Offices.

During Conference judging, the exhibitor should be prepared to discuss how the exhibited item is to be used, the way it was assembled and disassembled a part(s) to see how the exhibited item works. All projects must include a written report, explaining what was learned and how the project was constructed.

Class: Magic of Electricity - Exhibit an electrical circuit, with switch and bulbs, to demonstrate conductors and insulators OR an electromagnet OR a galvanometer OR an electric motor.

Class: Investing Electricity - Exhibit a circuit board, demonstrating parallel and series switches, including a circuit diagram OR a momentary switch, OR a 3-way switch using approved electrical materials; OR a rocket launcher, OR a burglar alarm.

Class: Wired for Power - Exhibit a 120V lighting fixture or other appliance which uses a switch; OR two electrical household circuits using 120V materials to comply with National Electrical Code, one with a simple on/off switch to control bulb, and one using 3-way switches to control light from two locations; OR other project which demonstrates principles in Unit 3 book.

Class: Entering Electronics - Exhibit any electronic or solid state appliance, and a written report explaining your project, and what you learned. When project is being considered, general safety, and workmanship should be considered. During Conference judging, the exhibitor should be prepared to discuss how the exhibited item is to be used, the way it was assembled and disassemble a part(s) to see how the exhibited item works. All projects must include a written report, explaining what was learned and how the project was constructed.

SMALL ENGINES

Exhibits must be work from current 4-H year.

Project area is exempt from the 30" x 30" size limitation.

Class: Display - A display identifying different engine or lawn and garden equipment parts or a display showing the function of the various engine or lawn and garden equipment parts.

Class: Operation and Maintenance - Exhibit an operable small engine (no more than 20HP) overhauled or rebuilt by the 4-H member. Include a maintenance schedule for the engine. During the conference judging, the exhibitor should be prepared to discuss their engine over-haul or rebuilding experience and to operate the engine for a short time.

WOODWORKING

Exhibits Must Be Work From current 4-H Year.

Project area is exempt from 30"x 30" size limitation

Class: Measuring Up - Level 1 - Any item made of wood constructed or refinished

by the member.

Class: Making the Cut - Level 2 - Any item book made of wood constructed or refinished by the member.

Class: Nailing It - Level 3 - Any item made of wood constructed or refinished by the member.

Class: Finishing Up - Level 4 - Any item made of wood constructed or refinished by the member.

AEROSPACE

Exhibits must be work from current 4-H year.

1. Rocket Judging - Monday, July 10, 6:00 p.m. – To Be Announced

2. Monday, July 17, 2:00-6:00 p.m. – Fair Check In. Displays
Check in 2:00-6:00 p.m. at the 4-H Bldg.

Rocketry

Class: Beginner Class – limited to members who are currently in their first year of the 4-H Rocketry Program. Members must build and launch a model rocket of their choice. Difficulty level 2 or higher recommended.

Class: Advanced Class – open to any member enrolled in the Rocketry Program. Build and launch a model rocket either from a kit or your own design. Difficulty level 3 or higher is recommended, but not required.

General Requirements:

1. Only Electric Igniters may be used.
2. All rockets must conform to the Model Rocketry Safety Code contained in your 4-H Model Rocketry Manual.
3. All safety requirements must be observed during the rocket launch. Anyone acting in an unsafe manner may be disqualified.
4. A member can show in only one class. First year members may, at their option, elect to participate in the advanced class.
5. The State Fair Delegates will be chosen from the Advanced

Class.

6. Judging will be based on: an interview with the judge, a detailed inspection of the model rocket and, a successful launch and recovery of the rocket. Craftsmanship and safety will be emphasized.

7. All rockets must be displayed during fair week, “touch-up” of rockets after firing but before display is permitted.

Kites

Class: Exhibit one hand-made kite. The exhibit will be a static display. The kite should be in good flying condition. Member should bring a list of materials and directions used in constructing the kite.

Model Airplanes

Class: Exhibit one model airplane. The exhibit will be a static display. This class is for flying models only. The airplane will not be launched. Member should bring the printed directions for construction of the airplane.

Aerospace Display

Class: Any exhibit related to aerospace that does not fit into above Classes. This may be an experimental or educational poster or display. Include an explanation of the display for public understanding.

A 4-H Bicycle Rodeo will be held on Thursday, July 13 in the Extension Office Parking Lot. Contestants are to report by 6:30 p.m.

Exhibitors MUST bring their own bicycle and may wish to bring a chain and lock. Bicycles may not be ridden in the parking lot, except when performing in the classes. It is highly recommended that bicycle riders bring and wear safety helmets during the riding exercises. Bicycles will be released at the end of the rodeo - after ratings are announced.

The Rodeo will consist of the following:

1. Written test on proper maintenance, adjustment, operation, and safety laws/rules regarding bicycles.

2. Inspection of exhibitor's bicycle, including brakes, height, safety equipment, etc.

3. Riding "test" through a safety course, observing all rules and regulations.

4. Additional information as listed below for specific class.

Class: Bicycle I - Exhibitor should be able to demonstrate two bicycle adjustments. (ie. seat, handlebars, etc.)

Class: Bicycle II - Exhibitors should be able to demonstrate two maintenance practices, (ie. oiling, chain adjustments, spoke replacements, etc.)

CROPS

All exhibited crops must have variety identified and be grown in current year.

Class: Soybeans – Exhibit five fresh plants, representative of project field (include root system that is washed).

Class: Corn – Exhibit two fresh plants, representation of project field (include root system that is washed).

Class: Small Grains – Exhibit one gallon of the current year's crop of oats, wheat, rye or barley.

Class: Crop Display – Experimental or educational project related to one experience from your project. Include explanation for public understanding. Poster or Display. Size limited to 30"x 30".

VEGETABLE GARDENING

All vegetables exhibited must have been grown by the exhibitor as part of their current 4-H project.

Class: Vegetable Market Basket –

1. Basket must include 6 or not more than 12 different vegetables.

There may not be more than 2 different varieties of any vegetable.

2. The number and type of vegetables used must conform to the Vegetable Plate/Basket List.

3. Basket must be labeled with the name and variety of all vegetables used.

4. The size of the display must not exceed a 2' wide by 2-1/2' deep display area.

Class: Vegetable Plate –

1. Exhibit must include only 2 single vegetable plates. (Exhibitor will furnish the paper plates.)

2. Number of vegetables on plates must conform to plate list below.

3. Only one variety on each plate.

4. Vegetables of different varieties may not be shown as separate plates (ie: red and yellow onions.)

FLOWER GARDENING

Exhibits must be labeled on a 3x5 card with Common Name, Latin name, Cultivar (variety), and annual or perennial designation. Provide your own containers.

Class: Exhibit in one container, 3 stems of blooms, each with attached foliage.

All three blooms or stems to be the same variety, color, shape and size. Must have been grown from seed, young seedling plants, bulbs or rhizomes by exhibitor.

Exhibitors choosing lilies should include no more than 2/3 foliage for their exhibit.

GARDENING INDOORS – NO HANGING PLANTS

Exhibits must be labeled on a 3x5 card with Common Name, Latin name, Cultivar (variety), date started, how started (cutting, bulb, corm, etc.); how grown (window sill, artificial light and/or greenhouse). Exhibit must be grown in current 4-H year.

Class: House Plants – Exhibit one house plant (foliage or flowering) in a container OR a terrarium OR a dish garden. Plant must be started and grown by exhibitor during the current 4-H year.

FLOWER ARRANGEMENT

Flower Arrangement Activity

All entries should be brought in the day of judging, Thursday, July 20 at 12:00 p.m.

1. Arrangements will be made in front of the judge in the Horticulture Building on Thursday, July 20, 2000 from 12:30 p.m. to 1:30 p.m.
2. Members must provide their own material and equipment.
3. A critique on the arrangements will be given by the judge at 2:00 p.m.
4. State Fair delegates will be chosen according to county enrollment and will be announced after critiques.
5. Members will be responsible for keeping their arrangements fresh.
6. No interaction with other people will be allowed until the exhibit is completed. Final arrangements must fit on the table top and fit into the 2-1/2' x 2-1/2' space.

Class: Beginning Flower Arranging – Table arrangements, fan, umbrella, corsage, etc. Exhibitors must make one arrangement in approximately one hour. Arrangement to be made from fresh and/or dried plant materials. Silks are not permitted. (Not State Fair eligible).

Class: Advanced Flower Arranging – Other – Table arrangements, fan umbrella, corsage, etc. Exhibitors must make two arrangements in approximately one hour to be made from fresh and/or dried plant materials. Silks are not permitted.

OTHER

Projects should be brought in on Monday, July 17, 2:00-6:00 p.m. with other Horticulture Exhibits. (Conference Judging 2:00-6:00 p.m. on July 17).

Class: Flower Arranging – Table arrangements, fan, umbrella, corsage, etc. made by exhibitor and brought to the fair. Arrangements to be made from fresh and /or dried plant material. Silks are not permitted (not State Fair eligible).
